On coming to the house, they saw the Child with His mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped Him. Then they opened their treasures and presented Him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

When they had gone, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream. "Get up," he said, "take the Child and His mother and escape to Egypt. Stay there until I tell you, for Herod is going to search for the Child to kill Him."




and he gave orders to kill all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who were two years old and under, in accordance with the time he had learned from the Magi.




and he went and lived in a town called Nazareth. So was fulfilled what was said through the prophets, that He would be called a Nazarene.





Herod's Depravity & His Demise (2:16–23)



Herod could have easily said, "I could murder my own mother, my own wife, most of my own sons, and the people would still approve of me." That's exactly what he did.

Herod had the Jews under his control because he brought security and a sense of stability. They were willing to overlook his massive set of flaws and his heart of wickedness.
