
Full Steam Ahead

But now that there is no more place for me to work in these regions, and since I have been longing for many years to visit you,

I plan to do so when I go to Spain. I hope to see you while passing through and to have you assist me on my journey there, after I have enjoyed your company for a while.

Now, however, I am on my way to Jerusalem in the service of the Lord's people there.

For Macedonia and Achaia were pleased to make a contribution for the poor among the Lord's people in Jerusalem.

They were pleased to do it, and indeed they owe it to them. For if the Gentiles have shared in the Jews' spiritual blessings, they owe it to the Jews to share with them their material blessings.

So after I have completed this task and have made sure that they have received this contribution, I will go to Spain and visit you on the way.

I know that when I come to you, I will come in the full measure of the blessing of Christ.

I urge you, brothers and sisters, by our Lord Jesus Christ and by the love of the Spirit, to join me in my struggle by praying to God for me.

Pray that I may be kept safe from the unbelievers in Judea and that the contribution I take to Jerusalem may be favorably received by the Lord's people there,

so that I may come to you with joy, by God's will, and in your company be refreshed.



Paul's Desire to Visit Rome (15:22-24)

Jesus said: "Whoever loses his life for My sake and the Gospel's will save it." In other words, it is better to lose your life than to waste it. If you live gladly to make others glad in God, your life will be hard, your risks will be high, and your joy will be full. [It's] not about how to avoid a wounded life, but how to avoid a wasted life.

The wasted life is the life without a passion for the supremacy of God in all things for the joy of all peoples.

It is better to dream great dreams for God, even if they are not fully realized, then to dream no dreams at all. Unless we see visions, dream dreams, and make plans, there will be no great steps forward in the work of the Gospel.

Paul's Plan to Visit Spain (15:28,29)

Paul believes that his work as a pioneer missionary has been completed since representative churches have been established in the region. By traveling to Spain Paul would continue his pattern of preaching the Gospel and planting churches where Christ was not previously named.

Paul's strategy was to evangelize the populous and influential cities, and plant churches there, and then leave to others the radiation of the Gospel into the surrounding villages.

Paul's Plea to Visit God (15:30–33)
