"He will not shout or cry out, or raise His voice in the streets." Isaiah 42:2

"A bruised reed He will not break, and a smoldering wick He will not snuff out. In faithfulness He will bring forth justice;"

"He will not falter or be discouraged till He establishes justice on earth. In His teaching the islands will put their hope."

Nevertheless, there will be no more gloom for those who were in distress. In the past He humbled the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the future He will honor Galilee of the nations, by the Way of the Sea, beyond the Jordan —

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned.

You have enlarged the nation and increased their joy; they rejoice before You as people rejoice at the harvest, as warriors rejoice when dividing the plunder.

For as in the day of Midian's defeat, You have shattered the yoke that burdens them, the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor.

The longing in Jesus' day was the longing for the Kingdom of God. The question in Jesus' day was, "How will it be brought to earth?"

And Mary said: "My soul glorifies the Lord"

"and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior,"

Luke 1:47

"for He has been mindful of the humble state of His servant. From now on all generations will call me blessed,"

"for the Mighty One has done great things for me — holy is His name."

"His mercy extends to those who fear Him, from generation to generation."

"He has performed mighty deeds with His arm; He has scattered those who are proud in their inmost thoughts."

"He has brought down rulers from their thrones but has lifted up the humble."

"He has filled the hungry with good things but has sent the rich away empty."

"He has helped His servant Israel, remembering to be merciful"

"to Abraham and His descendants forever, just as He promised our ancestors."

One extreme is saying that true bondage is to personal sin from which Christ frees us, and thus turning a blind eye on actual physical oppression. The other extreme is to suggest that the only sin is the sin of political oppression, and that Christ's only purpose in coming was to give human beings political freedom. The Messiah lifts the yoke of sin in order to lift the yoke of oppression. The Church forgets either yoke at its peril.
