What then shall we say? Is God unjust? Not at all!



For He says to Moses, "I will have mercy on whom I have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I have compassion."



It does not, therefore, depend on human desire or effort, but on God's mercy.



For Scripture says to Pharaoh: "I raised you up for this very purpose, that I might display My power in you and that My name might be proclaimed in all the earth."



Therefore God has mercy on whom He wants to have mercy, and He hardens whom He wants to harden.



What if God, although choosing to show His wrath and make His power known, bore with great patience the objects of His wrath — prepared for destruction?

Sometimes it is said that God hardens Pharaoh's heart, as here. Sometimes Pharaoh is said to harden his own heart (Exodus 8:15). Sometimes the position is described neutrally, by saying that Pharaoh's heart was hardened (Exodus 7:13).
