
Crossing to Life

When God Takes the Circuitous Route (13:17–14:4)



It was not the most obvious way. It was not the shortest way. It was not the most direct way. But it was the best way because it was God's way.

You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives.

And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose.

The whole thing was a ruse. God was tricking the Egyptians into thinking that the Israelites had no idea what they were doing. This would entice them to press what seemed to be their strategic advantage. But once Pharaoh attacked, his army would be destroyed. Then it would be obvious to everyone that God had planned the whole thing...that the glory of the victory belonged to Him alone.

"And I will harden Pharaoh's heart, and he will pursue them. But I will gain glory for myself through Pharaoh and all his army, and the Egyptians will know that I am the Lord." So the Israelites did this.

The purpose of this was not merely to provide additional frustration for the Israelites, but to provide an occasion by which God could demonstrate His own sovereignty to the Egyptians and illustrate the ability of God to care for His people.

When You're Between a Rock and a Hard Place (14:5–18)

Pharaoh is a classic example of the real nature of unbelief. Few, if any, have been exposed in a more direct way to God's miraculous power; what else would be needed to prove to him that Jehovah was God? But his unbelief was not intellectual; it was moral.

As Pharaoh approached, the Israelites looked up, and there were the Egyptians, marching after them. They were terrified and cried out to the Lord.

They said to Moses, "Was it because there were no graves in Egypt that you brought us to the desert to die? What have you done to us by bringing us out of Egypt?"

"Didn't we say to you in Egypt, 'Leave us alone; let us serve the Egyptians?' It would have been better for us to serve the Egyptians than to die in the desert!"

[This] provides a classic instance of what is now called "recovered memory." When hardship is encountered, the miserable past suddenly looks like the good old days. The Israelites were simply thinking the way most people think of the past when the present seems unbearable.

Moses answered the people, "Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the Lord will bring you today. The Egyptians you see today you will never see again."

"The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still." **Exodus 14:14**

"Be still" doesn't mean you can abdicate responsibility and do nothing. It means you take responsibility for what is your responsibility — but that you leave the rest to God. Our problem is often that we take responsibility for what is not our responsibility.

Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand.

When God Does the Impossible (14:19–31)

If you have problems believing that God could save His people by supernatural means, then you have issues with the creation, the incarnation, the resurrection, and more.

The water flowed back and covered the chariots and horsemen — the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed the Israelites into the sea. Not one of them survived.


But the Israelites went through the sea on dry ground, with a wall of water on their right and on their left.

That day the Lord saved Israel from the hands of the Egyptians, and Israel saw the Egyptians lying dead on the shore.

And when the Israelites saw the mighty hand of the Lord displayed against the Egyptians, the people feared the Lord and put their trust in Him and in Moses His servant.

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as on dry land; but when the Egyptians tried to do so, they were drowned.


For I do not want you to be ignorant of the fact, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud and that they all passed through the sea.

Who can proclaim the mighty acts of the Lord or fully declare His praise?




We have sinned, even as our ancestors did; we have done wrong and acted wickedly.
